**Crimes of the Kiev Regime  
Against  
Elderly and Senile Persons**

The International Public Tribunal on the Crimes of Ukrainian Neo-Nazis (Chairman – Maxim Grigoriev) was established during an International Conference on the initiative of human rights activists, lawyers, and journalists. Currently, it includes representatives of civil society from 35 countries around the world (USA, Canada, Germany, France, Spain, Poland, India, Argentina, Italy, Australia etc.) The main task of the International Public Tribunal is to collect evidence of crimes committed by the Kiev neo-Nazi regime, transfer it to national law enforcement agencies, and present the information on Russian and international platforms.

The International Public Tribunal on the Crimes of Ukrainian Neo-Nazis has recorded numerous war crimes committed by the Kiev regime against elderly and senile persons.

Shootings of elderly and senile people by the Armed Forces of Ukraine were a constant practice in the combat zones in the territories under their control.

S. Ilyina testifies: "... my mother was killed. She was killed in August when Ukrainian soldiers entered the village of Cherkasskoye Porechnoye in the Kursk region. She was 72 years old. She did not pose any threat to them." V. Vasilkonova from the city of Selidovo tells: "Kirillovna, she was a Ukrainian language teacher, she ran, ran into the entrance, a Ukrainian military man caught up with her and shot her. Nearby, a house down the street, a woman was feeding cats. Aunt Lena was 75 years old, they shot her. A 75-year-old woman was feeding cats, why did you shoot her?"

75-year-old V. Maksin tells: "On the evening of August 7, I received a gunshot wound, it went right through my elbow... When I got to the turn to Kursk, I noticed that four people were standing ahead. Two on one side, two on the other side of the road with machine guns, in helmets. And their gear was Ukrainian... they opened fire. When I started to bleed out, I decided to get out of the car, go into the ditch over there, hide behind the road. When I opened the door, the interior light came on, and then I got another machine-gun burst." L. Vradiy testifies: "In building 19 (Shchorsa St.), many were shot by Ukrainian military... On the third floor they shot Galya, and on the fifth – Lena. They were over 60, pensioners. Harmless women, good, normal, did no harm to anyone. And so she was running home and literally didn't make it one floor. People saw it. Ukrainians shot her."

A number of witnesses tell of horrific cases of rape of women. 83-year-old A. Bogunov from the Kursk region tells: " They came to one grandfather and said straight out, we'll take your daughter, use her, and bring her back. Well, the grandfather is old, what could he say to them? In Zaoleshenka the Ukrainian military raped an old woman..."

Elderly and senile people typically became victims of shelling of populated areas by the Ukrainian military. N. Ostapets from the city of Dmitrov testifies: "A mortar killed our neighbor. Evzhenko Evgeny Vladimirovich, he was 64 years old.

In cities under the control of the Kiev regime, targeted drops or strikes by FPV kamikaze drones on elderly and senile persons were not uncommon. 65-year-old resident of Kurakhovo, N. Glukhanich, tells: "I went out, dumped the trash, and on the way, I wanted to pick up some more firewood from the wood debris. And Ukrainians dropped a drone on me near the second entrance, where the trash is off to the side, there behind this building of ours. I have five fragments in me."

The Fourth Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War of 1949 defines the need to provide protection to civilians. To this end, "violence to life and person, in particular murder of all kinds, shall be prohibited at any time and in any place whatsoever." The testimonies presented in this report fully expose the Kiev regime in gross violations of the Geneva Conventions, which are war crimes that are not subject to a statute of limitations.

**Sysoeva Lyudmila Alexandrovna,**  
place of residence at the time of the interview – Mariupol, Stroiteley St.



"In April 2022, my husband and I were walking home from the college. It's not far from that college. We were the only ones walking. And a sniper started shooting at us. A Ukrainian sniper was shooting specifically at us. I felt a burning sensation immediately, and my arm went numb. My fingers still don't work. Half my palm works, half my palm is gone. I said to my husband: 'Edik, I think I've been shot.' He: 'Aaaa?' – and bent down. If he hadn't bent down, he would have been killed. Because just as he bent down to me, he (the sniper) shot at him, and so it happened that his back was slashed open. It was a graze, completely slashed his back open. Well, we lay down, fell. The sniper's mistake, I think, was that he thought he had killed us. Because we're lying on the ground, he says: 'Lyuda, what are we going to do? There are children there.' I say: 'Let's run.' And we lay there for a bit, then get up, and run. And he (the sniper),

apparently, had already been distracted from us. And when he saw that we were running, he (the sniper) started shooting at us again. We hid behind some containers. And so, in short dashes, in short dashes, we made it to the houses, and there people were cooking food. And when we ran up, they looked at us and said: 'My God, you're alive. We thought you wouldn't make it,' they said. 'And that man?' And that man, it turns out, was still running behind us, he didn't get up, he was probably killed. The people who were cooking say: 'Sit down, rest a bit.' So, I sat down, blood is pouring from my sleeve, blood is pouring from my arm. My husband's whole back is covered in blood. They immediately applied a tourniquet to stop the blood. Neighbors sewed up my husband's back with fishing line while he was conscious, to hold the flesh together..."

**Ilyina Svetlana Mikhailovna,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
from the village of Cherkasskoye Porechnoye (Kursk region)



"My mother, lying in her house, was first discovered by Shtanenko Alexander Nikolaevich. She had gunshot wounds. She was in the room we called the 'living room,' because it was a common area where we had a sofa, armchairs.

In that room, hanging on the wall were a portrait of my brother in a police uniform, he served in the police, and a portrait of my nephew in an airborne uniform, he served in the army. These two portraits were in that room of hers.

And in that room, my mother was killed. She was killed in August when Ukrainian soldiers entered the village of Cherkasskoye Porechnoye. She was 72 years old. She did not pose any threat to them. I don't understand at all why she needed to be killed."

### 3 **Golodnyak Alina Petrovna, 74 years old,** victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military from the city of Ugledar, DPR



"Once in 2022, there was a curfew, and two men didn't come into the entrance. I said, why didn't you come in and close the doors? They said they promised us canned stew. And then shelling. Instead of stew, we got an explosion. A man was killed instantly. He had only just entered the entrance. I got shell-shocked. It was at Easter. The apartment was completely destroyed. Of course, it deafened me a lot, all of it. The women started crying, her husband is still there, nothing left of the apartment, and the man was killed instantly. The little dog was killed there.

They shell us because they don't like us, basically, in Ukraine. They call us Separs. We were already in the basement here, two guys came in: what are you sitting here for? Why should we fight for you, Separs, 'those who waited'? We told them, don't scare us, why are you pointing your guns, there are sick people here."

### 4 **Vladimir Petrovich Maksin, 75 years old,** resident of the city of Sudzha (Kursk region)



"On the evening of August 7, I received a gunshot wound, it went right through my elbow. I was driving towards Kursk on the bypass road. I was crossing the railway line, and a Ukrainian copter landed on me. Actually, I didn't know it was a copter. I hear some crackling above me, stopped, then decided to drive on. When I got to the turn to Kursk, I noticed that four people were standing ahead. Two on one side, two on the other side of the road with machine guns, in helmets. And their gear was Ukrainian, not our guys', but blue bands on their helmets, blue on their sleeves. And a little further, higher up, there was a machine gun position.

I turned right, towards the station, thinking I'd slip through. Well, I couldn't slip through, they opened fire. I pulled onto the shoulder, lay down on the right seat. Anyway, I got hit by machine gun fire. When I started to bleed out, I decided to get out of the car, go into the ditch over there, hide behind the road. When I opened the door, the interior light came on, and then I got another machine-gun burst. I hear it going through the car, the rear window shattered. The Ukrainians were shooting at the light. I lay down by the front door and pretended to be motionless. I lay there for about forty minutes. The copter kept circling, then it came down low, about four meters. That's when this thing hit me. Went into my chest. It passed over my ribs. I lay there a while longer until it got dark. And then later, there were cars behind me too, already stopped behind me. Civilian cars, there were no military there at all."

## 5 Samborskaya Galina Dmitrievna, 75 years old, resident of the village of Kazachya Loknya (Kursk region)



"How was I wounded? We drove along our street to the intersection. There is a shop 'Vasilyok' there, near the shop a table, two benches, and a Ukrainian military man in camouflage uniform with a machine gun is standing there. One of his legs was on the bench, the other on the asphalt.

And suddenly he fires a burst at the first car. Our friends were in it. He swept the machine gun in one direction, and then in the opposite.

It hit higher in the car for the friends, lower for us. We only found out later why they sped off. It turns out his wife was killed outright. She was hit in the chest. And she only had time to repeat twice: they hit me, they hit me. And that was it, she died. And with us, they hit the wheel.

We drove off, my husband changed the wheel. I was covered in blood. My hands were completely red. Besides the wheel being shot through, the antifreeze was leaking. My husband found rubber gloves, tied up that little tube. Further on, gasoline is leaking, the same thing, the system is hit. He tied it up. We drove on, the car goes about four hundred meters, overheats.

We had to stop constantly. And so, in these small, small stretches, we made it to the village of Bolshoye Soldatskoye. There we found a medical station. Luckily for us, our military medics were there. They immediately cut everything off me, took it off. And they gave first aid to me and my husband.

My thigh is completely shot through. And the bullet was an expanding one... It's a very deep wound. They did the first operation here upon arrival, removed the fragments. The second operation was to remove tissue necrosis. And two days ago we had the final operation. They wanted to do a skin graft, but the wound wouldn't allow it. They say the grafted skin wouldn't take. My husband's knee was shot through."

## 6 Vasilkonova Valentina Evgenievna, 62 years old, victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military in the city of Selidovo, DPR



"There's a house nearby down the street, a woman was feeding cats. Aunt Lena was 75 years old, they shot her.

And Kirillovna, she was a Ukrainian language teacher, she ran, ran into the entrance, a Ukrainian military man caught up with her and shot her. A 75-year-old woman was feeding cats, why did you shoot her?

Those who write comments to me, who have left, say: it can't be, it's Ukraine, Ukraine didn't touch us when we lived there. Well, I stayed here, I know that it was Ukraine."

**Ostapets Nadezhda Vladimirovna,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the city of Dimitrov (DPR)



"A mortar killed our neighbor. Evzhenko Evgeny Vladimirovich, he was 64 years old. October 21, 2025. It came from where they (the Ukrainians) were. It came from there. And it was definitely a quadcopter that did it.

And the wall fell where we were milking the cow. Oh, we were milking the cow, milking the goats. The wall just fell. How did I run to the doors? Well, the neighbor was killed. There were five right away. Five or six. Six mines. Instantly. That's just houses... Horrible. Horrible. It's very scary.

And a mortar killed my ex-husband, Grabin Mikhail Ivanovich, he was 61 years old. In the house, he was disabled. He had a stroke. And he moved very, very poorly. We took care of him. A fragment from a mine flew into the house. I even photographed it on my phone. And I photographed him dying. It hit him in the leg,

blood came out, it completely severed his leg, just hanging by the skin. And no way to help. The blood came out, and the wound festered. Probably infection.

He was wounded on October 22nd, and on October 30th he died. He suffered for 9 days. And the neighbor was killed instantly. We went to milk the cow, and the shelling started. Our exact area was being shelled by mortars."

**Kozlov Nikolai Ivanovich,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the village of Plekhovo (Kursk region)



"We were wounded on December 7th. We went for water and got blown up, the well was mined. Korolev Vladimir Alekseevich and Pronyakin Vasily Ivanovich were with us.

The three of us got blown up there. Vasily Ivanovich had both legs and all bones shattered. I couldn't step on one leg. I crawled on my knees and hands, more than a kilometer to the house. And Vladimir Alekseevich entered the yard of another person and heard a shot. He got scared, stood for about 7-10 minutes, then it seemed to quiet down, he went in, looked, and he was killed. Zabelin Nikolai Alexandrovich. 67 years old. I go to his place to tell him something, and he's lying dead in the yard. Shot in the head. On another street, two more were killed by Ukrainians, and a woman burned in her house. She was infirm, couldn't walk. Her husband was shot in the yard and they set the house on fire. She was

born in 1946, and her husband was born in 1941 or 1940."



**9** **Sukova Linura Muratova,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian  
military in the city of Dimitrov (DPR)

"We had already moved, we asked to go to another house again. He was sitting on the porch, the shelling started. I say: 'Sasha, go into the summer kitchen.' 'It's safe here,' he says. He wasn't scared, why would he be, he was such a man. He says, I'll sit here. Well, Sasha, don't sit there, there's shelling. Well, for some time, about 10-15 minutes there was silence. And then the gate blew out, and a fragment went straight into his heart. It was Ukrainian shelling. He died on September 4th, we buried him on the 5th. He died on the 4th - Reshevsky Alexander Severyanovich. He was 72 years old.

His daughter stayed in Dnepr. The son is buried in the garden. Two graves nearby."



**10** **Vradiy Lyudmila Mikhailovna,**  
67 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the city of Selidovo, DPR

"In building 19 (Shchorsa St.), many were shot by Ukrainian military. Whoever opened the door for them, they shot. There was one acquaintance, she was going home to the 4th floor, and she was shot on the 3rd floor, they went up, and another neighbor was shot there, Lena. I don't know their last names. On the 3rd they shot Galya, and on the 5th Lena. They were over 60, pensioners. Harmless women, good, normal, did no harm to anyone. And so, she was running home and literally didn't make it one floor. People saw it. Ukrainians shot her. Those who didn't open the door for them,

barricaded themselves, and stayed alive. They saw that it was Ukrainian military who killed them."



**11** **Panova Svetlana Gennadievna,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian  
military from the city of Ugledar, DPR

"The Ukrainian authorities said: 'Go to Vektor for water.' Everyone who needed water went there.

And there were old ladies, all pensioners, and young people. A large number gathered. And the Ukrainian military hit there. Horrific. People had their arms and legs torn off. And heads. Many casualties. And immediately reporters.

The Ukrainian military sees a concentration of people and starts bombing. They shoot there."



**12** **Levchenko Alla Fedorovna,**  
75 years old, resident of the village  
of Zhuravli (Kursk region)

"We were sitting in the temporary shelter, and suddenly everything lit up. We fell to the floor.

We get up from the floor, Volodya is already covered in blood. Four wounds: they pulled out one small fragment, but they didn't pull out the big one, my right arm is wounded and under the heart. The gas boiler is broken, the gas stove is completely shattered, the pipe is pierced, the refrigerator is pierced. Ukraine was shelling. Neighbor Vasya comes. Their windows are broken, the bathhouse is all beaten up, everything is shot through, the dog is killed. One

woman was saying that Ukrainians drive and shoot right at the fences, everywhere there are civilians. Such shells were flying right through the houses. They drove and shot."



**13** **Shevtsov Vladimir Vasilievich,**  
69 years old, resident of the village  
of Zhuravli (Kursk region)

"When the Ukrainians came in, they didn't walk quietly, they shot. First, APCs came and bursts were rattling. They were shooting at the windows.

A bullet flew into my kitchen. The gate is pierced, holes in the gate, the neighbor's roofs are pierced. They were probably fighting with civilians or wanted to scare us.

On August 12th, around 11 a.m., I was standing, my wife and the boy were sitting on the sofa. A shot through the window, it pierces the window, then such a strong click, something even flashed. A bullet or fragment tore a chunk of metal out of the refrigerator door. I got a wound in the shoulder, a deep wound behind and below the elbow, they pulled out a small fragment. But the one deep in the shoulder, they didn't remove it, so as not to disturb the muscles."



**14** **Shulgina Oksana Olegovna,**  
victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian  
military in the city of Selidovo, DPR

"A woman in a nine-story building, over 70 years old, went to check on her apartment.

It was October 25th or 26th, 2024. And they just shot her. They found her shot dead on the couch.

Ukrainian military shot her."



**15** **Mizev Alexander Ignatievich,**  
65 years old, witness to crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the city of Selidovo, DPR

"Ukrainian troops killed my acquaintances – the Romanenko, killed and burned them. And when their sabotage and reconnaissance group was leaving, they killed my neighbors. The neighbors are Alexander Zaporozhets and Valera Lyashenko, my classmate.

It was October 27, 2024. They shot them. We buried them here, at home. Here is the grave of my neighbor Alexander. And there lies my classmate Lyashenko."



**16** **Zapisnoy Mikhail Nikolaevich,**  
69 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the village of Leonidovo  
(Kursk region)

"Chervyakova Tatyana Alekseevna from Novoivanovka went with her husband. And a Ukrainian APC met them. And it started shooting right at them. They fell there. The APC shot, moved away, saw they were moving. Adds more fire. She received severe leg wounds, arm wounds. They barely got out of there. They are over 70. Her husband died later. Ukrainian military stole my Niva car, the car had 30 thousand kilometers on it, brand new. They came, threatened with a grenade, demanded the car keys. The car disappeared."



**17** **Belousov Alexander Sergeevich,**  
20 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the city of Dzerzhinsk  
(Toretsk), DPR

"A Ukrainian drone was following us. When we came out, my grandmother got on her knees and started begging the drone not to kill us. There were cases when they killed, wounded. In 2023, my grandmother was sitting with her friend on the street. And somewhere a shot was very clearly heard, and suddenly a shell hit. There was a shot, and literally a second later a shell landed. It wounded my grandmother and the neighbor.

My grandmother is 83 years old – Gorban Nina Pavlovna. They were wounded in the chest and neck. The neighbor in the chest, my grandmother in the arm. The neighbor is the same age – they are the same age."

**18** **Vovk Alexander Ivanovich,**  
75 years old, victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the city of Kurakhovo, DPR



"Ukrainian drones hit pensioners. It hovers, and we are cooking on the grill. We have no electricity. We have no water. We fry, we boil. Anyway, we had to survive. The drone hovers, drops. Everyone is in shock.

Well, pensioners gathered, and it dropped right here, about three meters from here. The drone is hovering over us, and I think, we are pensioners, why kill pensioners? They paid taxes their whole lives. Literally three weeks pass, we calmed down a bit, and another one comes. Another one hit here. Shrapnel got everyone here. It's a miracle we're still alive. People were wounded by fragments from Ukrainian drones.

And they placed a mortar on the cellars right here, behind this building. And so, the drone hovers and gives commands, and they're pounding us.

Why kill a pensioner? I still can't understand that to this day. Do you see the fragments on the walls? Here they are, the walls are all shrapnel-pitted. And you see, all the windows in this entire entrance have been blown out.

There's a pensioner with a stroke sitting with us, he can't walk, with one leg. Tolya came out here to smoke, sits, tells the news. I'm here cooking on the grill. I say, Tolya, come here to me, try it, did I salt this borscht enough or not? On Chapaeva Street, there are so many wounded and dead people."

**19** **Shvedova Nadezhda Mikhailovna,**  
64 years old, victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the city of Dzerzhinsk (Toretsk), DPR



"Ukrainians shot people on the outskirts of our city. A lot of people disappeared.

A woman came to live on our street, young, she was 50, a medic. And so she went somewhere to her acquaintance, he had a bedridden mother.

She went there, and when she came to this Seryozha's, they found that the mother was shot in the forehead, this mother was killed. The residents themselves said that Ukrainians shot a lot of people. This medic was just looking after her. The woman was 85 years old. And when they came to their house, she was lying on the threshold, shot. This place is the so-called 'Zabalka' of ours. The men who stayed with us said that it was 'Azov' members who came to us. They said that 'Azov' members shot a lot simply at people running away. They killed, and that was it."

**Glukhanich Nikolai Vasilievich,**  
65 years old, victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the city of Kurakhovo, DPR



"On December 19, 2024, I went out, dumped the trash, and on the way, I wanted to pick up some more firewood from the wood debris. And Ukrainians dropped a drone on me near the second entrance, where the trash is off to the side, there behind this building of ours. I have five fragments in me. On my temple, here on my arm there's still a strong mark, on my thigh. Where the temple is, you can see it well here too. If you want, I'll take this off for you, show you how it tore up my shoulder. I was in this padded jacket, in this quilted jacket. This is how it tore it. It went from the bottom up. And into this temple, imagine, two centimeters from the eye or however much. It tore the hood, tore this, and it was all painful.

Also this here, in the shin, in the leg. In total, five fragments. They are small like this. They shot once like that. I had already dashed into the entrance, and then the second time, that drop was stronger. They were finishing us off. And another time before that, I was leveling the doors, I live in this entrance. And I reacted to the sound. As it hit, well, I also sat down in the entrance quickly. On my arm, it was, a very strong, well, like some kind of pellet. Very strong, like after a blow.

Very, very painful, all of it. Yes. They knew that civilians lived, they knew that civilians, they saw that we were trying to clean up near the house, so they observed us very well. And they aimed specifically. They knew it was civilians."

**Bogunov Alexei Nikolaevich,**  
83 years old, victim of crimes committed by the Ukrainian military  
in the city of Sudzha, Kursk region



"They came to one grandfather straight up and said, we'll take your daughter, use her, and bring her back. Well, the grandfather is old, what could he say to them? Again, right from the house, they took another father's daughter. Well, you understand what they did to her. They killed both young and old – just like that, for being in the wrong place at the wrong time. They didn't care if they were military or civilians in front of them. They are psychopaths, I don't know, or maybe they were on drugs.

They personally threatened us with execution. It was around New Year's. They were going to take our car. We had garages marked. Two of our garages were left. Marked 'People.' For refusing to give up the car, they said: 'I'll shoot you right here. Right in the eyes.' They waved their machine guns. In Zaoleshenka the Ukrainian military raped an old woman".



**22** **Manuylov Vasily Nikolaevich,**  
75 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military from the village  
of Kazachya Loknya (Kursk region)

"I was wounded on February 8th. After the Ukrainian shelling, I went to check the house where I lived.

I approached, horrified. The gable end was smashed, the windows were blown out. I left the house and went to see acquaintances. And again artillery shelling. I felt something hot, blood poured heavily. And I quickly went to the acquaintances so as not to lose consciousness. That's how I was wounded."



**23** **Melikhova Tatyana Mikhailovna,**  
62 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military from the city of Sudzha  
(Kursk region)

"A sniper shot at me too. I was going to see a friend, I didn't know she had already left. That day they were shooting at people. I walked along the fences, I look at the road, and I head for the fences, a car drove forward a bit. A Ukrainian car. I walked further, turned the corner already, came out onto the asphalt, and they started shooting. I heard shooting. And then near me, near my right shoulder, as that bullet went, it flew past me."



**24** **Andreevskaya Natalya Nikolaevna,**  
69 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the city of Kurakhovo (DPR)

"At the end of December 2024, my neighbor and I decided to check if our friend was alive, her apartment had burned down. And we went to look in broad daylight, and nothing foreshadowed trouble. We were walking from building 10, and the Ukrainian military were shooting from building 7. We reached the end of building five and then machine gun fire started. We were alone, we were walking together. My friend is from the very first building, just like me, from the Yuzhny microdistrict. They started shooting at our legs. My friend ran under the building, and there these fragments started flying around her and a bullet wounded her in the leg. Somehow it cut her flesh, and the bullet came out. It was cold, and she just gave up and started walking at first too. And we quickly here, blood is running, quickly. We had a nurse living here, in the basement, we went to her."



**25** **Filipskikh Alexander Vladimirovich,**  
61 years old, victim of crimes committed by the  
Ukrainian military in the city of Kurakhovo, DPR

"Once a Ukrainian soldier opened fire, they started shouting at him that we were peaceful, that we were civilians here. And he didn't care. One woman says, I was walking with a friend, the women were under 70 or maybe even over 70. And the Ukrainian soldier, bang, hit my neighbor in the arm. We're telling him, what are you doing? We're old women, peaceful, we say. And he laughs. Or maybe he was high, or doped up, who knows? Or maybe, as they say, a maniac, he likes to kill. And there were many such cases."



**26** **Bunina Klavdia Dmitrievna,**

"I came under Ukrainian shelling. They are angry at us. And they hate us. That's for sure. I was sitting in the little kitchen, and suddenly bang, and their shell hit the house directly. And the little kitchen window faced the house.

And so fragments hit me like this, tore a piece of flesh from my arm and hit my chest with fragments. Ukrainians hate us because they consider us separatists. When I go with my little cart to get some water, and the Ukrainian military, only if they are there getting water, they immediately ask people, why haven't you left?"

"A Ukrainian drone flew in one direction, turns around – in the other. I say, look, I see it, there it is. It lands and – boom – into us. Eight people, two were wounded. Besides me, an old woman was also wounded. The old woman was over eighty something. When Ukrainians were shelling the village, a man was killed outright. Lysachenko Mikhail. He was retired, of course. Born in 1958. When the shell came, he was crushed by the walls. There were no Russian troops there. Then they burned houses with drones.

What difference does it make to them, civilians or military."
